Reflection of Today's Scripture Texts

-Father Slowiak

Isaiah 42:1-7 Part of one of four "servant songs." The four songs describe a servant who is anointed by God, endowed with God's spirit, who would be patient, meek, merciful, willing to suffer cruelty, abuse and even death. The return from the Exile of Babylon was understood as the result of this servant setting right the relationship between God and Israel. Christians understand that the hope of these songs are fully realized in and through Jesus Christ who established an everlasting covenant in his dying and rising.

Acts of the Apostles 10:34-38 Peter is invited to the home of the Gentile, Cornelius, who was attracted to Judaism and perhaps attended the synagogue but did not adhere to the dietary regulations. Luke teaches to his readers in Acts that when humankind is left to their resources or reach an impasse, the Holy Spirit begins to be experienced. Here, in a giant leap Peter's vision is broadened, his faith deepened and his grasp of God's concerns became more definite in his insight: "I begin to see how true it is that God shows no partiality."

Mark 1:7-11 A sense of urgency here. John is introduced. Jesus is introduced. Jesus is tempted, Jesus begins his ministry. The teaching? The testimony? There is no time to waste, all time is important to God and God's time is vital to us.

In the Liturgy of the Church —Helen Ackermann

With this Sunday, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. As Father Al mentioned in his homily this past weekend, this is the second Epiphany or manifestation of who Jesus is as God, Emmanuel with us. With Cycle C of the Sunday readings, the third manifestation is the Wedding Feast of Cana.

What can we do to make a connection between the manifestation of Jesus as the Son of God during the Baptism in the Jordan and our own relationship to God? Perhaps the best we can do is to look to the celebration of our own Baptism. During this most sacred rite, we are baptized with water, we are clothed with a white garment, we are anointed with oil and we receive a candle symbolizing Christ as light of the world. When we listen to the Gospel of Mark, we hear that the heavens opened up and Jesus heard the words, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." So too it is at our Baptism. God looks upon his handiwork, and also proclaims, "You are my beloved Son or Daughter; with you I am well pleased."

Often people do not believe in the goodness which is present in their very being from their birth. God through his son, Jesus, in unity with the Holy Spirit loves us beyond all telling. As God loves his Son so he also loves us. Henri Nouwen tells us "These words revealed the true identity of Jesus as the beloved. Jesus truly heard that voice, and all of his thoughts, words, and actions came forth from his deep knowledge that he was infinitely loved by God. Jesus lived his life from that inner place of love."

So it should be with all of us. We can be confidant in the words we hear in our inner most being that we are the beloved of God. Our thoughts, words and actions should come from that inner place where we know that we are infinitely loved by God. Henri Nouwen goes on to tell us, "Once I have accepted the truth that I am God's beloved child, unconditionally loved, I can be sent into the world to speak and to act as Jesus did."

We remember this week, Hilary, bishop, doctor of the Church (Wednesday)

St. Hilary, bishop, doctor of the Church (315-368)

It is said that Hilary began every conversation and action with a prayer. He did great things by incorporating this practice into his daily life. He was born in the city of Poitiers in Gaul which is now part of France. His parents were pagans but Hilary did not want to believe in many Gods, but rather in one God. He discovered the Scriptures and became a Christian. At the age of 35, he became the bishop of Poitiers. During this time, bishops were elected by the local priests and approved by the community of people. He became known as a wise leader. He was also a great speaker. The emperor felt that Hilary was a troublemaker and exiled him for three years in what is now central Turkey. He suffered many hardships but remained cheerful. He spent this time writing about the Trinity. He also wrote some of the earliest Latin hymns. Finally he was able to return to Gaul and spent the rest of his life writing. He is known as a doctor of the Church which means that he was a wise teacher of the Church.

SCRIPTURE TEXTS—Ordinal 2

Opening Prayer: Lord God, as I mediate on Your Holy Word, help me to answer God's call to me. Allow me to follow Your Son, Jesus Christ with all my heart, mind and soul. I make this prayer in His name, He who is Lord forever and ever. Amen.

1 Samuel 3:3b-10, 19

Samuel was sleeping in the temple of the LORD where the ark of God was. The LORD called to Samuel, who answered, "Here I am." Samuel ran to Eli and said, "Here I am. You called me." "I did not call you, " Eli said. "Go back to sleep." So he went back to sleep. Again the LORD called Samuel, who rose and went to Eli. "Here I am, " he said. "You called me." But Eli answered, "I did not call you, my son. Go back to sleep."

At that time Samuel was not familiar with the LORD, because the LORD had not revealed anything to him as yet. The LORD called Samuel again, for the third time. Getting up and going to Eli, he said, "Here I am. You called me." Then Eli understood that the LORD was calling the youth. So he said to Samuel, "Go to sleep, and if you are called, reply, Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." When Samuel went to sleep in his place, the LORD came and revealed his presence, calling out as before, "Samuel, Samuel!" Samuel answered, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

Samuel grew up, and the LORD was with him, not permitting any word of his to be without effect.

I announced your justice in the vast assembly; I did not restrain my lips, as you, O LORD, know.

1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20

Brothers and sisters: The body is not for immorality, but for the Lord, and the Lord is for the body; God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power.

Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? But whoever is joined to the Lord becomes one Spirit with him. Avoid immorality. Every other sin a person commits is outside the body, but the immoral person sins against his own body. Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore glorify God in your body.

John 1:35-42

John was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, "Behold, the Lamb of God." The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus. Jesus turned and saw them following him and said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" — which translated means Teacher, "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come, and you will see." So they went and saw where Jesus was staying, and they stayed with him that day. It was about four in the afternoon. Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, was one of the two who heard John and followed Jesus. He first found his own brother Simon and told him, "We have found the Messiah" — which is translated Christ. Then he brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon the son of John; you will be called Cephas" which is translated Peter.

Reflection Questions:

- In this week's Gospel, Jesus is called Lamb of God, Messiah and Teacher. What do these titles tell you about Jesus?
- 2. How do we understand the call we have received by God? How does this call affect our daily lives?
- 3. Who are the people in your life who have enabled you to hear the call by God to follow his son, Jesus Christ? Take time to give God thanks for them.

Concluding Prayer: Lord God, I give You thanks for your call to follow Your Son Jesus Christ. Assist me as I go day by day always doing all for Your greater glory. Help me to lead others to Your Son, Jesus, He who is Lord, forever and ever. Amen.
